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
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WOMEN AND JUSTICE by Pr. Ron Moe-Lobeda

As we continue our discussion about the content of the ELCA Draft Statement on Women and Justice, I have been asked to be on a panel at our Synod Assembly and to speak very briefly about my experiences and thoughts on this matter. Ever since I was a sophomore in high school and I heard people questioning why a female senior classmate would be taking all of the necessary math courses so that she would be prepared to study engineering in college, I had this sense that this young woman had every right to study what she wanted to study. Perhaps it was growing up in a household with 5 sisters that sensitized me to the role and responsibility of women in society, but something in my psyche was programmed for a life-long challenge of seeking equal rights for women—quietly, but with some intentionality.

A few years later, my CPE supervisor in 1972 assigned me to design and lead a 3-week course on women's liberation for the female nursing students at California Medical Center in Los Angeles. I still have the curriculum tucked away somewhere in my files if anyone would like to borrow it! Then I met my wife, Cynthia, who challenged me about the language that we use for God in our worship and theological discussions. My discomfort with this suggestion was palpable at the time, but gradually my references to God became more intentionally neutral so that today replacing the pronouns "he", "his", and "him" rolls off my tongue with ease.

Certainly my ministry with homeless women for over 30 years was but "icing on the cake" in terms of coming to grips with how male domination has hurt so many women in our society—both individually and structurally—especially by "men of the cloth" and husbands who use the Bible to support their position of superiority in the church as well as in the home. The Re-imagining Conference that took place in 1993 in Minneapolis was an attempt to bring this whole issue to light, but was criticized and condemned by so many people in the church who weren't ready for such a radical vision for what could be in terms of challenging our references to God and the patriarchal language and dominance in the church.

At long last, the ELCA is addressing this issue head-on and has posited many recommendations in this Draft Statement on Women and Justice for what changes we can (need to) make in terms of our language and relationships that will establish greater equality and equity with women in the church as well as our in our society as a whole. Who we are and how we relate with one another is so engrained in our psyche and our human structures. However, the witness of Jesus, and of how he acknowledged and related with women in the gospels is a good place to start in re-examining and re-asserting the way that we can embody the beloved community that Jesus espoused by the way that we view, relate with, and treat women, girls, and gender non-conforming persons' bodies from this moment on. As we journey together along this path, we pray for the wisdom and courage of the Spirit to guide us into the way of Jesus and the truth that Jesus revealed about the fullness of God's love and peace.

CONFIRMATION

On Sunday, June 3, three of our young people at St. Mark's will be affirming their baptismal covenant at the 11:00 a.m. worship service. Halle Bohlig, Meghan Foster, and Katja Jackson have completed three years of confirmation instruction and will affirm the baptismal vows that their parents made on their behalf several years ago. We rejoice with Halle, Meghan, and Katja, and welcome them into our community of faith as confirmed members of the church. As they continue on in their journey of faith, we also pray for their continuing enrichment in the life and ministries of this congregation and the entire Church.

ALL YOUTH LOCK-IN

The youth of St. Mark's will be gathering for a lock-in (overnight) at the church on Friday – Saturday, June 15-16. As a way of celebrating the end of school and acknowledging the transition of our middle-school youth into the high-school youth group, we will spend the evening building our relationships, playing games, worshiping together, and sharing some of our current life experiences. 

For the following five days we will hear from inspiring speakers, do interactive learning activities in the NRG Arena with ELCA ministries and programs, participate in community service projects, do Bible studies (including with Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton), and every night we will participate in worship, singing songs, listening to testimonies and messages from Lutheran speakers, and just "be" with one another.



Says Katherine, "This whole opportunity is something I am very excited to be a part of for many reasons. It's not everyday that I get to be with people my age to explore my faith. I'll be able to talk to people just like me, and people who are just the opposite, and find similarities and differences with each. I hope that during this trip I will not only strengthen my relationship with God, but with the whole Lutheran community and form bonds with people I may have never met without this opportunity. I think it will be a wonderful experience for many, many people."

The prophet Jeremiah is a very interesting and provocative character as is the book that bears his name. His prophetic ministry spans some 44 years and the reigns of 6 rulers of Judah. He saw the best of kings in Josiah and the worst of kings in all who followed Josiah. He witnessed the horror of the conquest of Jerusalem by the Babylonians and remained in Judah until such time that he fled to Egypt. However, his disciples carried on in his prophetic tradition and made sure that what Jeremiah had spoken was documented for all of the people who eventually would resettle in and develop the land of Judah after their return from Babylon. The Book of Jeremiah is the result of this long journey and endeavor to hold the rulers, the priests, and all of the people from the least to the greatest accountable to the Word of God.

Pastor Ron will spend 3 weeks on Sundays, July 22, July 29, and August 5 talking about the life and ministry of Jeremiah, laying out the context in which he lived and prophesied, expounding upon the Book of Jeremiah, and making some applications to our current situation in this country. ST. MARK'S SAFE CONGREGATION TRAINING WELCOMES A NEW RESOURCE

"In recognition of the spiritual and public trust given to this faith community, St. Mark's Lutheran Church is committed to being a true sanctuary, both nurturing and protecting its members and visitors. Accordingly, the congregation will maintain official policies and procedures with the goal of preventing any instances of abuse, intervening appropriately into alleged incidents of abusive behavior, and caring for all involved." (St. Mark's Safe Congregation Policy)

In order to provide training in a timely manner, St. Mark's is now partnering with Darkness to Light – a non-profit committed to empowering adults to prevent child sexual abuse. The training can be taken on-line. Pr. Elizabeth has taken it and commented that the training was sobering, practical, and enlightening. (www.D2L.org)

All St. Mark's volunteers who work with children are required to take the training. However, Pr. Elizabeth is encouraging everyone to take it – council members, board members, ushers, lay leaders, and any member of St. Mark's. The cost of the training is \$10.00 per person and has been budgeted in our general operating budget.

The newly installed elevator is being used every day in our church building. The stained-glass windows have been beautifully restored. The new floor in the sanctuary is solid underneath all of the feet who use the sanctuary. Thank you to everyone who has made a pledge and financial gift to our Capital Campaign. 

ST. MARK'S NEIGHBORHOOD GROUPS

The Outreach Team has been discussing the concept of organizing neighborhood groups for members of St. Mark's for the purpose of building community within our geographically dispersed congregation. After vetting this concept with the Ministry Team leaders and the Church Council, the Outreach Team will move forward this summer in preparation to put this concept into motion next fall. Eleven (11) neighborhood groups have been identified throughout the Bay region. Each group will have anywhere from 19 to 25 members, and have a coordinator or co-coordinators to oversee what each group decides to do in terms of getting together as a group and supporting each other in other ways. Over the summer, we will be approaching individuals to serve as coordinators, and present some of the possibilities that could happen within each neighborhood group.
